

New Dimensions - Sunriver e-Group

We're excited to see how the Sunriver E-Group continues to develop and grow. We currently have more than 400 members, and the group has become an invaluable tool for many folks in our neighborhood.

The Neighborhood Patrol has brought a new dimension to the e-group. Patrol members often post reports to the group of what they observed on the previous night's watch. This helps to identify and make neighbors aware of "hot spots." It also helps to clear up misunderstandings, such as helping the patrol to identify residents who are out and about in the wee hours, so that they are not mistaken for people who are up to no good.

For several years, it has been common for e-group members to post messages alerting neighbors to suspicious or "anti-social" (for lack of a better term) activity: aggressive solicitors, people looking into yards or garages, reckless drivers, etc. As the e-group has grown, this practice has continued, and now it forms a valuable part of the message traffic.

It's not all crime and security, though. As an official communications channel for the SNA, we use the e-group to pass along valuable information. For example, Ginger Enrico, our Parkway Liaison, posts notices about Parkway meetings, construction, and monthly Ranger reports. Jessica Ocenosak, our Rancho Cordova Alliance of Neighborhoods (RCAN) representative, shares information about neighborhood programs in the city. Deanne Sherman posts messages about upcoming SNA events and other neighborhood and city activities. Our resident water-quality expert, Larry Ladd, keeps us up to date on critical drinking water issues.

Residents often post messages seeking advice on good contractors, items for sale or "free to a good home," Sunriver properties for rent, and so forth.

As you can see, the e-group has become a great channel for real-time neighborhood information. If you have never been a member, or

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Effort Launched to Save our Regional Parks' Legacy

From the Grass Roots Working Group Report

Our magnificent Regional Parks and Open Space System is in peril because of Sacramento County's continuing budget crisis.

Operated by the Sacramento County Department of Regional Parks, the system includes the American River Parkway, Dry Creek Parkway, Gibson Ranch Regional Park, Cosumnes River Preserve, Deer Creek Hills, Mather Regional Park and vernal pools, North Stone Lakes, Sherman Island and other treasures. The system is central to the quality of life here.

The County closed Gibson Ranch after Labor Day and Dry Creek Parkway is largely unstaffed. Deer Creek Hills and others remain undeveloped and largely unavailable to residents. Most troubling, the county has begun divesting its responsibilities to other jurisdictions, to nonprofits, and to for-profit groups. (And fewer accessible

parks elsewhere, means increased use of the American River Parkway.)

Ranger patrols and maintenance staff have been sliced in half, which means bicycle, hiking trails and other areas are not as clean, safe or pleasant for users.

A Grass Roots Working Group, supported by Save the American River Association (SARA), has launched Save Our Regional Parks' Legacy. The aim is to secure adequate, stable, long-term funding for operations, maintenance, development, expansion and connection of these open spaces and developed recreation sites.

The Working Group's vision is: an integrated system of Regional Parks and Open Spaces linked by a bicycle and pedestrian transportation network. It would also help relieve overuse of the American River Parkway. *continued on pg. 2*

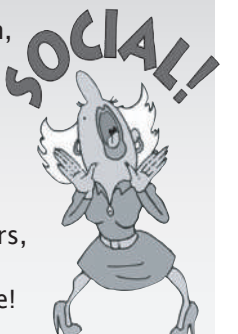

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Fall and Winter Gardening by Pam Britton

We have the wonderful opportunity here in the Sacramento region, to grow just about anything you might pick during the fall and winter months. Now that our days are cooler, doing garden chores comes a little easier. Pull out that summer garden and get started with your cool-weather vegetables and flowers.

Now is the time to plant seeds for many flowers, directly into the garden, including cornflower, nasturtium, poppy, portulaca and sweet peas. In the vegetable garden, seed bok choy, mustard, spinach, radishes and peas. Plant garlic and onion sets. Now is the ideal time to set out cool-weather bedding plants including calendula, pansy, snapdragon, primroses and viola. Plant daffodil bulbs now, over a three-week period to extend next spring's bloom. Not to be forgotten are fall chrysanthemums. Their splendor of colors over the next few months, will brighten up any area of your garden you may choose.

It's also time to plant native perennials. The Sacramento Chapter of the Native Plant Society, Elderberry Farms, has a wonderful selection of ready-to-plant, one gallon pots. Their nursery is located right here in Rancho Cordova, at Soil Born Farms*, 2140 Chase Drive. The U.C. Davis arboretum also offers native plants for sale.

Trees and shrubs will thrive being planted in the fall. So come out into your garden, enjoy the fruits of your labors. Spring is just around the corner!

if you have not tried it recently, I encourage you to sign up for free at <http://sunriveronline.org>. Click the Join Sunriver button and fill out the short online form.

Please note that we do need your address on the form in order to process your request. This is because membership is limited to Sunriver residents and property owners, plus a small number of local officials (council members, plus a few city staff and police officers). Also, there are several other communities in the US named "Sunriver," and sometimes folks in other states will find us by web searching and try to sign up.

If you're concerned about getting too many e-mails from the group, try the "Daily Digest" delivery option. This sends one e-mail per day, which includes all of the messages from the previous 24 hours. Messages in the Digest are grouped by subject, making it easier to follow conversations. You can easily switch to or from the Digest format at any time, by clicking links at the bottom of each group message.

Finally, please note that this is a moderated discussion group. Since we are committed to making it a useful and welcoming place for all members, we have established these guidelines for posting messages to the group:

- Keep it on topic. The purpose of the group is to discuss Sunriver and Rancho Cordova issues – not politics, religion, or other divisive subjects.
- Keep it original. Please do not forward jokes, urban legends, etc. to the group. We get plenty of those already...
- Keep it brief. Concise messages are easier to follow.
- Keep it polite. We don't always have to agree, but we should make every effort to be civil when we disagree.
- Keep it coming. A lively discussion makes for an interesting and active group.

Save Our Regional Parks' Legacy

The Working Group raised over \$50,000 in donations for a feasibility study by the Trust for Public Land (TPL) and the Dangermond Group. TPL is researching four governance options: A new independent regional district, a new dependent regional district, a new countywide community services district, and the existing county department if it had a dedicated revenue source.

The Dangermond Group is studying a nonprofit conservancy option and will deal with budget estimates for operation and maintenance of the Regional Parks and Open Space System.

The Working Group will review the TPL and Dangermond Group results and other information and make a recommendation to the public in late January, followed by a community summit in early February. Sacramento County has specified that a measure needs to be on the November 2012 ballot for voter consideration.

What can you do to help protect our Regional Parks and Open Space for future generations?

- Ask the Working Group to present to your group, church, or school.
- Sign up for Save Our Regional Parks' Legacy updates.
- Give money! No government funds are available for this effort.
- Buy a Parks Passport.
- Appreciate your regional parks by visiting them – and take a friend!
